Much of the sun exposure that causes skin damage occurs in childhood and adolescence. By the age of 15, many children have developed irreversible skin damage from exposure to the sun.

While skin cancer is the most common cancer in Australia, it is estimated that 95% of skin cancers can be prevented through reducing exposure to ultraviolet radiation from the

sun.

Students are required to wear sun safe hats at all times when outdoors and are encouraged to seek shade during peak UVR times during the school day and to wear SPF 50+ sunscreen.

Schools Spectacular

My Schools Spectacular experience began back in March, when I auditioned for a featured artist spot in the 2018 show. I sent in two videos of myself singing to the Spec team and a couple weeks later I got an email that said I had gotten through to the first live auditions. I was ecstatic! I then had to find two more songs of contrasting genre to sing on the 10th of April, in front of 3 people in the Spec team. My mum and I flew to Sydney the morning of the audition. When I got there, we had to do a workshop to warm up our voices and prepare for the audition. I then did a little bit of a sightreading session with Ian Jefferson, one of the choral conductors. The next part of the morning was my audition. I sang Never Enough by Loren Allred and Orange Coloured Sky by Nat King Cole. I was super nervous and I messed up some of my lyrics but I did the best I could do.

A couple weeks after that, I got an email saying that I unfortunately didn't make it through to the next auditions. I was really upset but soon after, they sent me an email inviting me to audition for core choir. Core choir is basically apart of the mass choir but we all have microphones and earpieces. We started rehearsals in October and had 11 rehearsals before the shows. We had rehearsals almost every week, and I flew to Sydney on my own most of the time. It was a great experience for me to do that all on my own. I learned how to check in to my flights, how to catch a cab from the airport to my destination, how to go through security and basically find my way around the airport and the city. I also had the help of my sister Demi who I stayed with every trip.

We had 35 songs to learn and memorise in 11 rehearsals, which was pretty nerve wracking, but also a bit of a challenge. I made a heap of new friends and also caught up with many old friends that I had met at previous camps. The rehearsals were very long and tiring, with every one lasting 6-10 hours. We rehearsed usually with the backing vocalists and the featured artists, and towards the end we got to have about two rehearsals with the orchestra before Spec Week.

Show week or Spec Week as we like to call it, is the week leading up to the shows. Every day starting from Sunday, we had a rehearsal usually going for about 10 hours on average. We sang every song over and over again until we got them all perfect. In the last two days before opening night, we had full dress rehearsals in Qudos Bank Arena with all of the dancers, choir, orchestra, backing vocalists and featured artists. All of us were very tired and worn out, but luckily our tutors Michael, Clare and Blade came to the rescue. Every show, they brought about 5 packets of lollies, put them into containers and we passed them around core choir. It was just a special little thing they did for us which we thought was really cool.

We did 4 shows all up: the schools' matinee, opening night, another matinee and then closing night. We recorded every show, so it was important that we always performed to our best ability. We got prop bags, which included little props that we used in the show. Because the arena is so big and we needed to hear ourselves sing, core choir got these little packs which we plugged our earphones into so we could hear ourselves. We got a starting note on the keyboard before each song which kept us in pitch and in the right key. A metronome which kept us in time, and also some lead vocal. In between the matinee and the evening show on the Friday we had 4 hours to kill so we all got some food, went to the park and played card games. It was really nice to have some 'Team Bonding Time'.

The shows were SO much fun and it was incredible to see it all come to life. Putting the show together took almost a year and of course, we wouldn't have been able to do what we did without our amazing backstage crew, conductors, tutors, choreographers, producers, lighting and sound team, directors etc. A special thanks also to our amazing conductor Liz Scott. It was such an incredible experience and I am definitely looking forward to hopefully being a part of the 2019 show. 1000/10 would recommend.


